WOU Takes Double-Digit Win Streak Into ROOT Game

PORTLAND, Ore. – Its beginning to look like the *real* race in the GNAC is for second place.

And that is important because both the regular-season champion and the second-place finisher earn first round byes for the conference tournament.

The tournament begins Thursday, Mar. 5 at Alterowitz Gymnasium on the campus of MSU Billings.

After a road sweep at Ellensburg and Nampa last weekend, Western Oregon (20-3, 12-1) has a 2 ½ game lead over second-place Alaska Anchorage (13-9, 9-3) for the first bye.

The Wolves are 3 ½ ahead of Central Washington (13-6, 8-4) and Northwest Nazarene (10-12, 8-4) for the second bye. Seattle Pacific (16-7, 8-5) is four back.

All five teams have good opportunities to claim one of the two available byes. Western Oregon needs just three wins in its final five contests to secure one.

The Wolves have the opportunity to get one of those wins Wednesday when they take a 10-game win streak to Lacey, Wash., to take on Saint Martin's (6-17, 3-10) in a ROOT SPORTS game. Tipoff is at 8 p.m.

WOU's win streak is the 14th longest in GNAC history. The Wolves also had a nine-game win streak earlier this season.

Those are WOU's two longest win streak during the GNAC era (since 2001-02). WOU's current 11-game home win streak equals the 15th longest in GNAC history.

WOU also has won 11 consecutive conference home games, matching the fifth longest in GNAC history.

The WOU at Saint Martin's game is the only game on the GNAC schedule Wednesday.

On Thursday, Alaska Anchorage will try to protect its one-game lead for the second bye when it hosts MSU Billings (5-18, 3-10).

Other games Thursday will send Seattle Pacific to Fairbanks to take on Alaska (5-15, 2-10), Central Washington to Bellingham to take on Western Washington (13-10, 6-7) and Northwest Nazarene to Burnaby to battle Simon Fraser (9-12, 4-9).

WOU Ranked 18th in NABC, 16th in D2SIDA Polls

Western Oregon moved up two positions to No. 18 in this week's NABC national poll after two road victories last week.

The Wolves were the only GNAC team to receive votes in the weekly poll.

Three other West Region teams are ranked in this week's poll – BYU-Hawaii at No. 13, Cal Baptist at No. 22 and Azusa Pacific at No. 22.

In this week's D2SIDA national poll, Western Oregon is ranked 16th. The Wolves are ranked second and Seattle Pacific is ranked 10th in the D2SIDA regional poll.

Nichols, Turner Fourth in National Statistics

Western Oregon guard Julian Nichols and Western Washington forward Anye Turner are ranked fourth nationally in assist/turnover ratio and blocked shots, respectively, in this week's NCAA Division II national statistical report.

Nichols is averaging 3.44 assists for every turnover, while Turner, last week's GNAC Player of the Week, is averaging 3.18 blocked shots.

Turner has had one or more blocks in 23 consecutive games dating back to the end of the 2013-14 season. He has had at least two blocks in every game this season except for six contests in which he had one.

Nichols also ranks second in the GNAC in assists (6.13) and steals (2.17) and third in free throw percentage (87.7) and Turner is also the conference rebound leader (8.4).

Other GNAC players ranked in the Top 10 in NCAA Division II include Simon Fraser guard Sango Niang, Central Washington guard Dom Williams, Central Washington forward Joseph Stroud and Seattle Pacific guard Riley Stockton.

Niang ranks seventh in scoring (23.8) and 10th in assists (6.3). He's the GNAC leader in both category.

Williams ranks ninth in Division II in three-pointers made (3.40). Stroud ranks eighth in blocked shots (2.95). Stockton is 10th in assist/turnovers (3.06).

In team categories, Simon Fraser ranks first in Division II in scoring (107.7), three-pointers made (12.8), steals (13.5) and turnover margin (9.4) and seventh in offensive rebounds (15.3).

Seattle Pacific ranks second in rebound margin (12.7), fourth in field goal percentage (51.8) and seventh in scoring margin (15.9).

Western Washington ranks fifth in blocked shots (5.6) and Western Oregon ranks sixth in free throw percentage (77.6).

GNAC Team Notes

Alaska: Ashton Edwards had 18 points and five assists and Almir Hadzisehovic had 16 points and eight rebounds in the Nanooks' hard-luck loss at the Alaska Airlines Center. Edwards had a relatively good look at a three for the win at the buzzer after UAA's Travis Thompson made 1-of-2 free throws with five seconds to go for a two-point lead.

Alaska Anchorage: Travis Thompson made 4-of-8 three-pointers and scored 23 points to lead the Seawolves past the Alaska Nanooks and secure sole possession of second place. With at least seven games remaining (6 regular-season and at least one playoff game), Thompson needs just 10 treys to equal the GNAC career record of 292 treys. Thompson also had seven assists moving into 27th place on the GNAC career list with 313.

Central Washington: Dom Williams scored 53 points, including 30 in a 78-71 loss to Western Oregon. He joined Simon Fraser's Sango Niang as the only players in the GNAC to record two 30-point games this winter. Gary Jacobs had 36 points and Joseph Stroud had 27 points, 12 rebounds and 11 blocks.

Montana State Billings: Tyler Nelson (13 points, 10 rebounds) and Jordan Perry (12 points, 10 rebounds) each recorded their first double-doubles of the season in an 85-78 win over Simon Fraser. Nelson finished the weekend with 20 points and 16 rebounds, while Perry had a 20-20 (points/rebounds) and also led MSUB with seven assists. Jace Anderson had a team-high 37 points.

Northwest Nazarene: Alex Birketoft had 33 points and Erik Kinney had 32 as the Crusaders split two games, shooting 52.4 percent (54-of-103). Kinney also had team highs for rebounds (16) and assists (matching Mike Wright's six). Birketoft and Matyas Hering each had three steals.

Saint Martin's: Isaac Bianchini, who leads the GNAC in three-point shooting (53.0 percent), made 8-of-12 and netted 28 points in losses at NNU and CWU. Riley Carel and Trey Ingram each had 26 points in the two road contests. The Saints kept the two games close make 21-of-38 treys. Ingram converted on 6-of-12 and Carel made 4-of-6,

Seattle Pacific: The Falcons lost back-to-back home games to Western Washington and Simon Fraser, extending their losing streak to three, its first streak of that length since 2011. Free throw shooting hurt SPU, which was just 31-of-60 from the line, including 4-of-17 by Cory Hutsen, who had a team-best 42 points ... Riley Stockton had 20 points, 15 rebounds and eight assists. He now ranks 10th in the GNAC in both career rebounds (689) and assists (412).

Simon Fraser: Sango Niang had 53 points, including 28 in an 84-83 win at Seattle Pacific, its first-ever win against the Falcons in 14 games. Niang made 18 of 33 shots, including 7-of-16 treys. A three-pointer by Niang with 1:44 left gave SFU a 84-79 lead and the Clan then held on.

Western Oregon: Andy Avgi scored 42 points as the Wolves earned a road sweep and opened up a 2 ½ game lead in the GNAC. Avgi had 27 points against CWU as the Wolves overcame a 10-point deficit just prior to the end of the first half to beat the Wildcats for just the fourth time in 29 all-time games at Nicholson Pavilion. Devon Alexander had 34 points and Julian Nichols had 22 points, 13 assists and nine rebounds.

Western Washington: After starting the season 0-6 on its oponents home courts, the Vikings got a sweep defeating Seattle Pacific and MSU Billings. WWU used a 12-0 run in the first half to take control in a 82-72 win at Brougham Pavilion Thursday. WWU then won Saturday at Billings 75-65. Mac Johnson led the Vikings' balanced attack with 27 points. Ricardo Maxwell and Kyle Impero each had 26 points, Anye Turner had 23 and Jeffrey Parker had 22.

Players of the Week – Week By Week

Nov. 10-16 – Jeffrey Parker, Western Washington (F, 6-6, So., Richmond, CA – Salesian) and Joseph Stroud, Central Washington (F, 6-8, Jr., Las Vegas, NV – Sierra Vista/Pierce College) ... Parker scored 43 points and also had 18 rebounds leading the Vikings to two wins in the 13th Chuck Randall Classic. Parker made seven of 17 3-pointers and shot 51.7 percent overall, cashing in on 15-of-29. He was named the tournament's MVP ... Stroud earned all-tournament honors leading the Wildcats to two wins in the Seattle Pacific Sodexo Tip-Off tournament. He came off the bench to score 24 points, making nine of 10 shots. He also led CWU in rebounds (11) and blocked shots (7). His last basket with one second half came on a dunk to break a 68-68 tie in Saturday's 70-68 win over Academy of Art.

Nov. 17-23: Ruben Silvas, Alaska (G, 6-3, 175, Jr., Tucson, AZ) had 33 points, shooting 62.5 percent (15-of-24) as the Nanooks made their 2014-15 season debut in the GCI Alaska Invitational. The JC transfer from Arizona also had 16 rebounds, two assists and a steal and wasn't charged with a turnover in earning all-tournament honors as the Nanooks won one of three contests.

Nov. 24-30: Julian Nichols, Western Oregon (G, 6-2, 175, Jr. Upland, CA) scored 51 points and also 10 rebounds, a team-high 14 assists and six steals in leading the Wolves to three road West Region victories, including a 67-52 win at 2014 playoff qualifier Dixie State. Nichols made 15 of 31 field goal attempts and also converted on 19 of 20 foul shots. Twenty-six of his points came in Saturday's 83-73 win at the Academy of Art.

Dec. 1-7: Dom Williams, Central Washington (G, 5-11, Sr., Tacoma, WA – Curtis & Tacoma CC) scored 50 points and also had 10 assists and just one turnover in wins over Montana State Billings and defending GNAC champion Seattle Pacific. He had a career-high 31 points and five assists in an 88-79 win over MSUB Thursday, connecting on 11 of 20 shots, including 5-of-7 three-pointers. Williams then added 19 points and five assists in a 73-67 victory against SPU Saturday, converting on 4-of-7 three-point shots. The win snapped a four-game CWU losing streak to the Falcons. For the week, Williams made 18-of-37 shots

(48.6 percent), including 9-of-14 three-pointers. He also converted on 5-of-6 foul shots.

Dec. 8-14: Mitch Penner, Seattle Pacific (F, 6-5, Jr., Seattle, WA – Kennedy) scored 26 points and also had 11 rebounds, three steals and two blocks to lead the Falcons to a 100-67 win over George Fox. Penner, who made 7-of-12 field goal attempts, was perfect from the foul line connecting on 11-of-11.

Dec. 15-21: Shawn Reid, Seattle Pacific (F, 6-4, Sr., Post Falls, ID) scored a team-best 36 points shooting 71.4 percent in leading the Falcons to wins over Dixie State (76-66) and Rollins (74-54) in the Las Vegas Challenge. Reid made 15-of-21 shots, including 5-of-9 three-pointers. He also led the Falcons with three steals. Reid came off the bench against Dixie State with SPU trailing 17-2 and scored 30 points in just 18 minutes to rally SPU to the 10-point win. Reid, whose previous SPU career-high was 13, made 12 of 15 shots, including 5-of-7 from the arc.

Dec. 29-Jan. 4: Ashton Edwards, Alaska (G, Jr., Compton, CA – Long Beach CC) and Brian McGill, Alaska Anchorage (G, 6-2, Jr., Clackamas, OR – Western Oregon) ... Edwards scored 53 points including 30 in Thursday's 64-60 home win against Western Washington and 23 in Saturday's 121-111 victory against Simon Fraser. Edwards made 16-of-32 field goal attempts including 7-of-12 three-pointers and 14-of-15 free throws. He also had seven rebounds and four assists. His point total against the Vikings represented nearly 47 percent of the Nanooks' team total ... McGill had 48 points, nine rebounds and nine assists as the Seawolves also swept SFU (108-86) and Western Washington (62-60). McGill scored 28 points and had six rebounds in 26 minutes against the Clan Thursday and had a game-high 20 points, including the game-winning shot with 6.5 seconds left, in Saturday's win against Western Washington. In that contest, McGill was perfect from the foul line, converting on 8-of-8 attempts.

Jan. 5-11: Momir Gataric, MSU Billings (F, 6-5, Jr., Sunnyvale, CA – West Valley College) and Andy Avgi, Western Oregon (F, 6-6, Jr., Woodburn, OR) ... Gataric scored 45 points and shot 72.7 percent from the floor (16-of-22) as the Yellowjackets split two games defeating Simon Fraser 111-104 Saturday for their first conference win of the season. He had 25 points on 10 of 14 shooting in a 88-68 loss to Western Washington before contributing 20 points, five assists and four assists against the Clan ... Avgi scored 41 points as the Wolves defeated Northwest Nazarene and Central Washington to extend their home win streak to eight and take over sole possession of first place in the GNAC. Avgi made 17 of 29 shots, including a key tip-in with 23 seconds remaining in the win against NNU.

Jan. 12-18: Kevin Rima, Northwest Nazarene (F/C, 6-7, Sr., Fairbanks, AK - Hutchison) and Sango Niang, Simon Fraser

(G, 6-0, Sr., Paris, France – Chaffey CC) ... Rima, who is averaging 12.2 points per game, scored 47 points and also had 19 rebounds to lead the Crusaders to their fourth and fifth wins in their last six games. He had 18 points and 12 rebounds, recording his 13th career double-double, in a 107-103 victory against Simon Fraser Thursday. On Saturday, he tallied 29 points and grabbed seven rebounds in a 80-73 conquest of Western Washington. Rima, who made 18 of 25 field goal attempts and 11 of 13 foul shots, helped rally NNU from double-digit second-half deficits in both games ... Niang scored 71 points, including 46 in a 104-95 loss Saturday at Central Washington. That is the second highest single-game point total in GNAC history trailing only Western Washington's Ryan Diggs who scored 47 in 2006. Niang made 18 field goals equaling the GNAC single-game record set by Gerrit Eades of Saint Martin's in 2002. In two games, he made 27 of 46 field goal attempts and also had 11 assists.

Jan. 19-Jan. 25: Jordan Wiley, Western Oregon (G, 6-6, Jr., McKenzie River, OR) scored 26 points in a 114-75 win at Simon Fraser and had 15 points including a key three-pointer with 1:49 left in a 90-87 victory at Western Washington as the Wolves completed the first half of the conference race with an 8-1 record and a one-game lead over Seattle Pacific and Central Washington. Wiley shot 75.0 from the field (12-of-16) and also had nine rebounds, four assists and three steals in the two wins. He made 7-of-8 three-pointers against SFU equaling the second highest total for three-pointers made in a game with just one miss in GNAC history.

Jan. 26-Feb. 1: Andy Avgi, Western Oregon (F, 6-6, Jr., Woodburn, OR) and Derrick Fain, Alaska Anchorage (G, 6-4, Sr., Dallas, TX – The Master's) ... Avgi scored 46 points, including a career-high 33 in a 94-84 overtime win against Seattle Pacific Saturday as the Wolves opened up a two-game in the conference race with wins over Montana State Billings and the Falcons. Avgi made 17 of 28 shots and 11 of 12 foul shots. He also had nine rebounds, five assists, three steals and two blocks. WOU extended its win streak to eight games and its home win streak to 11 with the two wins ... Fain scored 42 points and also had 15 rebounds as Alaska Anchorage, which plays five of its final seven games at home, improved to 5-2 in conference road contests with wins at Western Washington and Simon Fraser. Fain made 13-of-22 shots, including 9-of-15 from the three-point line. He also converted on 7-of-8 free throws as the Seawolves shot 81.2 percent (56-of-69) from the line.

Feb. 2-8: Anye Turner, Western Washington (F, 6-7, Sr., Olympia, WA – Black Hills) scored 23 points and also had 23 rebounds and nine blocks in leading the Vikings to a pair of 10-point road wins at Seattle Pacific (82-72) and MSU Billings (75-65). Turner played a key role defensively in WWU's win at SPU. He had all five of the Vikings' blocked shots as WWU held SPU to a 44.4 shooting

percentage. The Falcons came into the game ranked fourth nationally in field goal percentage shooting 52.1 percent. Turner, who ranks sixth in GNAC history in career blocked shots with 152, converted 58.8 percent of his attempts, making 10 of 17. He also had four assists and a steal without committing a turnover.
