Field Set For 2015 GNAC Men's Basketball Tournament

PORTLAND, Ore. – With more than a week left in the regular-season, the field is set for the 2015 Great Northwest Athletic Conference Men's Basketball Championships.

Northwest Nazarene (11-14, 9-6) and Western Washington (16-10, 9-7) secured the final two berths for the six-team tournament, which begins Thursday, Mar. 5 at Billings, Mont., with wins Thursday.

The Crusader, who are currently in fifth-place, earned their trip to Billings with a 67-56 win against Alaska on ROOT SPORTS.

Western Washington, meanwhile, had a convincing road victory at Monmouth, scoring 16 consecutive points in the

second half to break a 44-44 tie on the way to a 73-50 victory against Western Oregon, snapping the Wolves' 11-game win streak, the 11th longest in GNAC history.

Despite the loss, WOU (21-4, 13-2), which had already clinched a first-round bye, secured no worse than a tie for its first GNAC basketball title when Central Washington (15-7, 10-5) defeated Alaska Anchorage 80-67 at Nicholson Pavilion.

CWU's win threw the race for the GNAC's second first-round bye into a three-way tie between the Wildcats, Seawolves (14-11, 10-5) and Seattle Pacific (18-7, 10-5).

Lurking just one game back of that trio is Northwest Nazarene.

Seattle Pacific was idle Thursday before facing Montana State Billings (5-20, 3-12) Saturday at 3 p.m. in a ROOT SPORTS broadcast.

The Falcons finish their regular-season with three home games, including a key contest next Thursday against Central Washington.

Alaska Anchorage plays at Northwest Nazarene Saturday before finishing its campaign with home games next week against Western Oregon and Saint Martin's (6-19, 3-12).

Central Washington hosts Alaska (6-17, 3-12) Saturday, then completes its regular-season next week at SPU and MSUB. NNU plays the same two teams in reverse order.

In addition to the MSUB-SPU, UAA-NUU and UAF-CWU games, Saturday's schedule also sends Simon Fraser (11-13, 6-10) to Monmouth to take on Western Oregon in a 4 p.m. contest and Western Washington to Saint Martin's for a 7 p.m. tipoff.

The Vikings will take a six-game win streak into its game at Lacey, the current longest in the conference, against the Saints who lost at home Thursday to Simon Fraser 103-87.

It was the 12th time this season the Clan has scored 100 or more points, but the first time in its last 10 contests.

FREE THROW SHOOTING: During its six-game win streak, Western Washington has shot 74.9 percent from the foul line (128-of-171), after hitting just 62.4 percent (259-of-415) in its first 18 contests.

WOU Ranked 15th in NABC, 16th in D2SIDA Polls

Western Oregon moved up three positions to No. 15 in this week’s NABC national poll after posting a 66-56 ROOT SPORTS win at Saint Martin’s the previous Wednesday.

The Wolves, however, remained at No. 16 in the D2SIDA national poll.

Both polls are unofficial. The only poll that counts is the NCAA Division II West Regional poll which will determine the five teams that join the GNAC, PacWest and California College Athletic Association champions in the West Regional tournament. The regional begins Friday, Mar. 13 at a site to be determined.

The first of three regional polls was released Wednesday and the Wolves were ranked third. Seattle Pacific was ranked 10th in the inaugural poll.

Turner Ranks 4th in Division II Blocked Shots

Western Washington forward Anye Turner is the highest ranked GNAC player in the NCAA Division II national statistical report following Thursday’s games. He ranks fourth in blocked shots averaging 3.12 per game.

Turner has had one or more blocks in 26 consecutive games dating back to the final game of the 2013-14 season.

He has had at least two blocks in every game this season except for six contests in which he had one and has had 17 in his last five games.

Two Central Washington players also rank in the Top 10. Dom Williams ranks sixth in three-pointers made (3.61) and Joseph Stroud is seventh in blocks (2.86).

Two other players have Top 10 national rankings. Siango Niang of Simon Fraser ranks seventh in assists (6.5) and ninth in scoring (23.1) and Julian Nichols of Western Oregon is eighth in assist/turnover ratio (3.27).

In team categories, Simon Fraser ranks first in Division II in scoring (105.8), steals (13.1) and turnover margin (8.7).

The Clan also ranks second in three-pointers (12.5) and 10th in offensive rebounds (14.9).

Seattle Pacific is second in rebound margin (12.2), fifth in field goal percentage (51.5) and eighth scoring margin (15.1).

Western Washington ranks fifth in blocked shots (5.4). Western Oregon is 10th in free throw percentage (76.8).

Thursday's GNAC Team Notes

Alaska: Alex Duncan scored 18 points and had a team-high three steals in the Nanooks' 11-point road loss at Nampa. UAF also got 11 points from Eric Fongue, who made 3-of-5 three-pointers, and 10 points and eight rebounds from Almir Hadzisehoviic. The Nanooks shot just 33.3 percent in the contest, making 17-of-51.

Alaska Anchorage: Dom Hunter made 7-of-10 three-pointers to account for his team-high 21 points in the Seawolves' 13-point loss at Ellensburg. The rest of the team was just 1-for-16 from the arc. Derrick Fain had 12 points and Travis Thompson finished with 11 points.

Central Washington: Dom Williams led the Wildcats, who outscored UAA 49-35 in the second-half after trailing 32-31 at the break, with 26 points. Williams was 4-of-8 from the arc. Marc Rodgers had an impressive night, missing just one shot (3-4 FG, 2-3 3FG, 2-2 FTs) in scoring 10 points. He also had a team-high four steals, three assists and four rebounds in 21 minutes on the court. Gary Jacobs had 16 points and Joseph Stroud had 12 points, nine rebounds and a pair of blocks.

Northwest Nazarene: Erik Kinney had a team-high 17 points in the Crusaders' 67-56 ROOT SPORTS win, making 5-of-11 field goals and 7-of-8 free throws. NNU made 13-of-24 shots in building an eight-point lead at halftime. Bouna N'Diaye had 12 points, Kevin Rima finished with 11 increasing his career total to 1,015 and Alex Birketoft had 10 points and eight rebounds.

Saint Martin's: Ryan Rogers (20 points, 10 rebounds) and Victor Ieronymides (11 points, 10 rebounds) had double-doubles in the Saints' loss to Simon Fraser. Riley Carel had eight assists.

Simon Fraser: Justin Cole scored 23 points and Sango Niango had a double-double with 15 points and 12 assists in the Clan's 103-87 win at Saint Martin's. It was SFU's 12th 100-point game of the season, but its first in 10 games. SFU leads the nation in scoring averaging 105.8 points per game. Niang's assist total was his fourth double-digit total of the season.

Western Oregon: Despite its home loss Thursday to Western Washington, which ended an 11-game win streak, the Wolves clinched at least a tie for their first GNAC title, when Central Washington knocked off second-place Alaska Anchorage 80-67. The Wolves, who played their game without Andy Avgi due to a medical condition, were led by Julian Nichols with 13 points and Devon Alexander with 12.

Western Washington: The Vikings scored 16 consecutive points to break a 44-44 tie on the way to a 73-50 upset of Western Oregon, clinching a post-season playoff berth. Jeffrey Parker led WWU with 18 points, while Aryne Turner (15 points, 11 rebounds) and Mac Johnson (11 points, 11 rebounds) had double-doubles.

Last Week's GNAC Team Notes

Alaska: The Nanooks snapped a nine-game losing streak during which two of the losses were by two points and one was in overtime with a 87-65 home win over MSU Billings. The final loss was an 84-74 decision to Seattle Pacific. Ashton Edwards led a balanced attack in the two games with 27 points, making 5-of-10 three-pointers.

Alaska Anchorage: Travis Thompson made 5-of-7 three-point shots and scored 36 points as the Seawolves split two games, staying in second place. Thompson, who made 15-of-16 foul shots, now has 287 treys, five shy of the GNAC career record. Brian McGill had nine assists, increasing his career total to 299.

Central Washington: Dom Williams scored 50 points and also had 11 assists as the Wildcats split two games, rallying from a 21-point deficit before losing 83-77 at Western Washington Thursday and then defeating Simon Fraser 112-84. All 13 of CWU's previous conference games this season – win or lose – have been decided by single digits. Williams had a 27-point, 10-assist, no turnover double-double in that contest. Gary Jacobs had 39 points and Joseph Stroud had 29 points, 14 rebounds and five blocks.

MSU Billings: Marc Matthews had back-to-back 20 point games, scoring a career-high 25 at Alaska Anchorage in which he made 12-of-12 free throws and 20 against Alaska. He made 13-of-28 field goals and 13-of-14 free

throws. Jace Anderson had eight assists and Tyler Nelson was credited with 19 rebounds.

Northwest Nazarene: Alex Birketoft scored 39 points and had 19 rebounds in games at Burnaby (17 points, 11 rebounds) and Bellingham (22 points, 8 rebounds). He shot 60 percent (15-of-25) and also blocked four shots. Erik Kinney netted 32 points and had 11 rebounds and five steals.

Saint Martin's: Victor Ieronymides (15 points, 8 rebounds) and Riley Carel (14 points, 8 rebounds) both fell two rebounds shy of double-doubles in Wednesday's 66-56 loss to Western Oregon. SMU came into the game leading the GNAC in three-point percentage (39.5), but made only 6-of-27 (22.2) from the arc. SMU's Isaac Bianchini leads the GNAC in three-point percentage (51.7) this season and ranks 10th in all-time career percentage (44.8).

Seattle Pacific: Cory Hutsen led the Falcons with 43 points and Mitch Penner had 26 points and 14 rebounds in wins at Fairbanks and Anchorage. The Falcons trailed by 10 points (37-27) late in the first half before rallying for a 10-point win Thursday at Fairbanks before earning an overtime victory Saturday at Anchorage. Riley Stockton finished the trip with 17 rebounds increasing his career total to 706.

Simon Fraser: Roderick Evans-Taylor scored 23 points and had six steals, equaling the second most in the GNAC this winter, to lead the Clan past NNU. Sango Niang had 22 points and eight assists and Justin Cole had 18 points. Niang made 4-of-7 treys and Cole made 4-of-8.

Western Oregon: Andy Avgi extended his string of consecutive field goals made to 12 before missing his 10th shot in a 66-56 win at Saint Martin's. Avgi made 10 of 11 and finished with 22 points. His 59.1 career shooting percentage ranks eighth in GNAC history. Julian Nichols had 11 points and team-highs of four assists and three steals.

Western Washington: Jeffrey Parker led the Vikings to two home wins with 37 points, while Anye Turner had 33 points, 19 rebounds and six blocked shots. Ricardo Maxwell had 20 points and Turner had his fourth double-double (17 points, 12 rebounds) in Thursday's win against CWU. The Wildcats have won just one time at Carver Gymnasium in the GNAC era (since 2001-02) defeating WWU 68-58 on Feb. 23, 2008.

Players of the Week – Week By Week

Nov. 10-16 – Jeffrey Parker, Western Washington (F, 6-6, So., Richmond, CA – Salesian) and Joseph Stroud, Central Washington (F, 6-8, Jr., Las Vegas, NV – Sierra Vista/Pierce College) ... Parker scored 43 points and also had 18 rebounds leading the Vikings to two wins in the 13th Chuck Randall Classic. Parker made seven of 17 3-pointers and shot 51.7 percent overall, cashing in on 15-of-29. He was named the tournament's MVP ... Stroud earned all-tournament honors leading the Wildcats to two wins in the Seattle Pacific Sodexo Tip-Off tournament. He came off the bench to score 24 points, making nine of 10 shots. He also led CWU in rebounds (11) and blocked shots (7). His last basket with one second half came on a dunk to break a 68-68 tie in Saturday's 70-68 win over Academy of Art.

Nov. 17-23: Ruben Silvas, Alaska (G, 6-3, 175, Jr., Tucson, AZ) had 33 points, shooting 62.5 percent (15-of-24) as the Nanooks made their 2014-15 season debut in the GCI Alaska Invitational. The JC transfer from Arizona also had 16 rebounds, two assists and a steal and wasn't charged with a turnover in earning all-tournament honors as the Nanooks won one of three contests.

Nov. 24-30: Julian Nichols, Western Oregon (G, 6-2, 175, Jr. Upland, CA) scored 51 points and also 10 rebounds, a team-high 14 assists and six steals in leading the Wolves to three road West Region victories, including a 67-52 win at 2014 playoff qualifier Dixie State. Nichols made 15 of 31 field goal attempts and also converted on 19 of 20 foul shots. Twenty-six of his points came in Saturday's 83-73 win at the Academy of Art.

Dec. 1-7: Dom Williams, Central Washington (G, 5-11, Sr., Tacoma, WA – Curtis & Tacoma CC) scored 50 points and also had 10 assists and just one turnover in wins over Montana State Billings and defending GNAC champion Seattle Pacific. He had a career-high 31 points and five assists in an 88-79 win over MSUB Thursday, connecting on 11 of 20 shots, including 5-of-7 three-pointers. Williams then added 19 points and five assists in a 73-67 victory

against SPU Saturday, converting on 4-of-7 three-point shots. The win snapped a four-game CWU losing streak to the Falcons. For the week, Williams made 18-of-37 shots (48.6 percent), including 9-of-14 three-pointers. He also converted on 5-of-6 foul shots.

Dec. 8-14: Mitch Penner, Seattle Pacific (F, 6-5, Jr., Seattle, WA – Kennedy) scored 26 points and also had 11 rebounds, three steals and two blocks to lead the Falcons to a 100-67 win over George Fox. Penner, who made 7-of-12 field goal attempts, was perfect from the foul line connecting on 11-of-11.

Dec. 15-21: Shawn Reid, Seattle Pacific (F, 6-4, Sr., Post Falls, ID) scored a team-best 36 points shooting 71.4 percent in leading the Falcons to wins over Dixie State (76-66) and Rollins (74-54) in the Las Vegas Challenge. Reid made 15-of-21 shots, including 5-of-9 three-pointers. He also led the Falcons with three steals. Reid came off the bench against Dixie State with SPU trailing 17-2 and scored 30 points in just 18 minutes to rally SPU to the 10-point win. Reid, whose previous SPU career-high was 13, made 12 of 15 shots, including 5-of-7 from the arc.

Dec. 29-Jan. 4: Ashton Edwards, Alaska (G, Jr., Compton, CA – Long Beach CC) and Brian McGill, Alaska Anchorage (G, 6-2, Jr., Clackamas, OR – Western Oregon) ... Edwards scored 53 points including 30 in Thursday's 64-60 home win against Western Washington and 23 in Saturday's 121-111 victory against Simon Fraser. Edwards made 16-of-32 field goal attempts including 7-of-12 three-pointers and 14-of-15 free throws. He also had seven rebounds and four assists. His point total against the Vikings represented nearly 47 percent of the Nanooks' team total ... McGill had 48 points, nine rebounds and nine assists as the Seawolves also swept SFU (108-86) and Western Washington (62-60). McGill scored 28 points and had six rebounds in 26 minutes against the Clan Thursday and had a game-high 20 points, including the game-winning shot with 6.5 seconds left, in Saturday's win against Western Washington. In that contest, McGill was perfect from the foul line, converting on 8-of-8 attempts.

Jan. 5-11: Momir Gataric, MSU Billings (F, 6-5, Jr., Sunnyvale, CA – West Valley College) and Andy Avgi, Western Oregon (F, 6-6, Jr., Woodburn, OR) ... Gataric scored 45 points and shot 72.7 percent from the floor (16-of-22) as the Yellowjackets split two games defeating Simon Fraser 111-104 Saturday for their first conference win of the season. He had 25 points on 10 of 14 shooting in an 88-68 loss to Western Washington before contributing 20 points, five assists and four assists against the Clan ... Avgi scored 41 points as the Wolves defeated Northwest Nazarene and Central Washington to extend their home win streak to eight and take over sole possession of first place in the GNAC. Avgi made 17 of 29 shots, including a key tip-in with 23 seconds remaining in the win against NNU.

Jan. 12-18: Kevin Rima, Northwest Nazarene (F/C, 6-7, Sr., Fairbanks, AK - Hutchison) and Sango Niang, Simon Fraser (G, 6-0, Sr., Paris, France – Chaffey CC) ... Rima, who is averaging 12.2 points per game, scored 47 points and also had 19 rebounds to lead the Crusaders to their fourth and fifth wins in their last six games. He had 18 points and 12 rebounds, recording his 13th career double-double, in a 107-103 victory against Simon Fraser Thursday. On Saturday, he tallied 29 points and grabbed seven rebounds in a 80-73 conquest of Western Washington. Rima, who made 18 of 25 field goal attempts and 11 of 13 foul shots, helped rally NNU from double-digit second-half deficits in both games ... Niang scored 71 points, including 46 in a 104-95 loss Saturday at Central Washington. That is the second highest single-game point total in GNAC history trailing only Western Washington's Ryan Diggs who scored 47 in 2006. Niang made 18 field goals equaling the GNAC single-game record set by Gerrit Eades of Saint Martin's in 2002. In two games, he made 27 of 46 field goal attempts and also had 11 assists.

Jan. 19-Jan. 25: Jordan Wiley, Western Oregon (G, 6-6, Jr., McKenzie River, OR) scored 26 points in a 114-75 win at Simon Fraser and had 15 points including a key three-pointer with 1:49 left in a 90-87 victory at Western Washington as the Wolves completed the first half of the conference race with an 8-1 record and a one-game lead over Seattle Pacific and Central Washington. Wiley shot 75.0 from the field (12-of-16) and also had nine rebounds, four assists and three steals in the two wins. He made 7-of-8 three-pointers against SFU equaling the second highest total for three-pointers made in a game with just one miss in GNAC history.

Jan. 26-Feb. 1: Andy Avgi, Western Oregon (F, 6-6, Jr., Woodburn, OR) and Derrick Fain, Alaska Anchorage (G, 6-4, Sr., Dallas, TX – The Master's) ... Avgi scored 46 points, including a career-high 33 in a 94-84 overtime win against Seattle Pacific Saturday as the Wolves opened up a two-game in the conference race with wins over Montana State Billings and the Falcons. Avgi made 17 of 28 shots and 11 of 12 foul shots. He also had nine rebounds, five assists, three steals and two blocks. WOU extended its win streak to eight games and its home win streak to 11 with the two wins ... Fain scored 42 points and also had 15 rebounds as Alaska Anchorage, which plays five of its final seven games at home, improved to 5-2 in conference road contests with wins at Western Washington and Simon Fraser. Fain made 13-of-22 shots, including 9-of-15 from the three-point line. He also converted on 7-of-8 free throws as the Seawolves shot 81.2 percent (56-of-69) from the line.

Feb. 2-8: Anye Turner, Western Washington (F, 6-7, Sr., Olympia, WA – Black Hills) scored 23 points and also had 23 rebounds and nine blocks in leading the Vikings to a pair of 10-point road wins at Seattle Pacific (82-72) and MSU Billings (75-65). Turner played a key role defensively

in WWU's win at SPU. He had all five of the Vikings' blocked shots as WWU held SPU to a 44.4 shooting percentage. The Falcons came into the game ranked fourth nationally in field goal percentage shooting 52.1 percent. Turner, who ranks sixth in GNAC history in career blocked shots with 152, converted 58.8 percent of his attempts, making 10 of 17. He also had four assists and a steal without committing a turnover.

Feb. 9-15 - Cory Hutson, Seattle Pacific (C, 6-8, Sr., Sammamish, WA - Skyline) scored 43 points, including 23 in a 73-72 overtime win at Alaska Anchorage Saturday as the Falcons kept alive their chances to earn a first-round bye in next month's conference playoffs with two victories. Hutson, who made 11 of 15 shots against the Seawolves, scored a basket with 2:18 left in overtime to give SPU its final lead at 70-68. In two wins in Alaska, Hutson made 20 of 29 field goal attempts and also had nine rebounds and a team-best three blocks helping SPU limit the Seawolves and Alaska Nanooks to a combined 40.7 shooting percentage.
