CWU, SPU, NNU Battle For First-Round Bye

PORTLAND, Ore. - Western Oregon has clinched the GNAC's regular-season title and a first-round bye in next week's GNAC Championships at Alterowitz Gymnasium in Billings, Mont.

The Wolves will play in the conference semifinals on Friday, March 6 against the winner of a Thursday firstround game between the No. 4 and No. 5 seeds.

This weekend three teams - Seattle Pacific, Central Washington and Northwest Nazarene - will chase the second first-round bye.

Currently, SPU and CWU are tied for second one game ahead of NNU. Alaska Anchorage is also one game back of the Falcons and Wildcats. However, both teams swept the season series with the Seawolves, who as a result, cannot finish higher than third.

Seattle Pacific hosts Central Washington Thursday in a key showdown at Brougham Pavilion.

In the last 10 regular-season games at Brougham between SPU and CWU, each team has won five. Including a NCAA West Region playoff game in 2005, the Falcons have a 6-5 advantage since 2005 at Brougham.

Since the formation of the GNAC in 2001-02, SPU has won eight of 14 games at Brougham between the schools, including the 2005 NCAA game.

If either SPU or CWU win two games this weekend that team will claim the No. 2 seed. If NNU sweeps Montana State Billings and SPU, and SPU beats CWU, the Crusaders will earn the bye as long as CWU then also defeats MSUB.

Western Washington has also qualified for the regional and could end up seeded either fourth, fifth or sixth depending on what happens this weekend.

The Vikings, who have won seven straight, complete their regular-season Thursday with a home game against Simon Fraser.

That is one of five games on Thursday's schedule.

The schedule will also send Western Oregon to Anchorage to play Alaska Anchorage, Saint Martin's to Fairbanks to take on Alaska and Northwest Nazarene to Billings to face MSUB.

WOU Ranked 20th in NABC, 23rd in D2SIDA Polls

Western Oregon fell five positions to No. 20 in this week's NABC national poll after splitting two games last week, losing 73-50 to rejuvenated Western Oregon Thursday before defeating Simon Fraser 93-91 Saturday.

The Wolves, who also slipped seven positions to No. 23 in the D2SIDA national poll, played both games without Andy Avgi, who is the GNAC's third leading scorer averaging 18.1 points per game.

In last week's official NCAA West Regional poll, WOU was ranked third and Seattle Pacific was 10^{th} .

The second of three NCAA regional polls will be released Wednesday. Eventually the rankings will decide which five teams join the GNAC, CCAA and PacWest champions in the NCAA West Regional, which begins Friday, March 13 at a site to be determined.

In this week's unofficial D2SIDA Regional poll, WOU and SPU are ranked in the same positions as in last week's NCAA poll.

Turner Remains 4th in Division II Blocked Shots

Western Washington forward Anye Turner remains as the highest ranked GNAC player in the NCAA Division II national statistical report this week. He ranks fourth in blocked shots averaging 3.04 per game.

Turner has had one or more blocks in 27 consecutive games dating back to the final game of the 2013-14 season.

He has had at least two blocks in every game this season except for seven contests in which he had one.

Two Central Washington players also rank in the Top 10. Dom Williams ranks sixth in three-pointers made (3.74) and Joseph Stroud is seventh in blocks (2.83).

Two other players have Top 10 national rankings. Sango Niang of Simon Fraser ranks eighth in assists (6.5) and Julian Nichols of Western Oregon is seventh in assist/turnover ratio (3.39).

In team categories, Simon Fraser ranks first in Division II in scoring (105.2), steals (12.8) and turnover margin (8.2). The Clan also ranks second in three-pointers (12.5).

Seattle Pacific is second in rebound margin (12.5), fifth in field goal percentage (51.6) and eighth scoring margin (15.3). Western Washington ranks fifth in blocked shots (5.4).

Last Week's GNAC Team Notes

Alaska: Almir Hadzisehovic led the Nanooks with 33 points and also had 11 rebounds in contests at Nampa and Ellensburg. Eric Fongue had 21 points in the two contests, making 5-of-9 shots from the arc. Anthony Reese grabbed the most rebounds (16) and tied Alex Duncan for the most steals with five.

Alaska Anchorage: Travis Thompson and Derrick Fain both had 30-point games and both made 7-of-10 three-pointers last Saturday at Northwest Nazarene. Thompson scored 33 points and set a GNAC career-record in the process for three-pointers increasing his total to 295, three more than Jake Linton of Saint Martin's (2006-09). For the weekend, both players scored 44 points. Dom Hunter made 7-of-10 three-pointers to account for his team-high 21 points in the Seawolves' 13-point loss at Ellensburg, but didn't play Saturday.

Central Washington: Dom Williams scored 26 points in an 80-67 home win against Alaska Anchorage, then added 27 more in a 75-66 win versus Alaska recording his 10th and 11th 20-point games of the season. Williams, who ranks sixth in NCAA Division II in three-pointers made (3.74 per game), made 10 of 22. Joseph Stroud had 14 rebounds and four blocks and Marc Rodgers had eight assists. Rodgers made 4-of-6 shots, 3-of-4 from the arc.

MSU Billings: Marc Matthews registered his fifth 20-point game of the season scoring 21 of the Yellowjackets' 59 points in a ROOT SPORTS game at Seattle Pacific Saturday.

Also in double figures for the Yellowjackets were Antoine Hosley with 15 points and Emmanuel Johnson with 10 points.

Northwest Nazarene: Alex Birketoft (39 points), Erik Kinney (31 points) and Kevin Rima (30 points) combined for exactly 100 of NNU's 167 points in wins over UAF and UAA. Birketoft, who made all 10 of his foul shots, was 7-of-14 from the three-point line and 11-of-20 overall. He also had a team-high 17 rebounds ... Kinney had a team-high 17 points in the Crusaders' 67-56 ROOT SPORTS win against the Nanooks, which clinched a GNAC tournament berth for NNU, its first under the GNAC six-team, one-site format. NNU was the fifth seed, splitting two games, in the 2011 eight-team tournament which was played at host sites.

Saint Martin's: Tyler Idowu scored 39 points, shooting 75 percent (18-of-24) in SMU's contests with Simon Fraser and Western Washington. Idowu had a career-high 24 points making 12 of 17 field goals against the Vikings. Ryan Rogers finished with 26 points and a team-high 18 rebounds. Riley Carel had team-highs for assists (14) and steals (4).

Seattle Pacific: Matt Borton had his third double-double of the season, scoring 20 points and grabbing 10 rebounds in the Falcons' 81-59 home court win against MSU Billings Saturday. Cory Hutsen also had 20 points. SPU, which ranks second in Division II in rebounding, outboarded the Falcons 45-25. SPU ranks fifth in field goal percentage at 51.6 and improved that mark slightly by making 31 of 58 (53.4).

Simon Fraser: Michael Harper, who averages nine points per game, scored 34 points, making 13 of 17 shots including 6-of-10 from the arc. Justin Cole had 33 points, including 23 in a 103-87 win at Saint Martin's. Sango Niang had 27 points and 18 rebounds, including a 15-point, 12-assist double-double against the Saints. Niang's assist total was his fourth double-digit total of the season. SMU's point total against SMU was its 12th 100-point game of the season.

Western Oregon: Julian Nichols scored 47 points, including a career-high 34 – 24 in the second half - in a 93-91 win against Simon Fraser Saturday as the Wolves clinched their first GNAC regular-season title in the 14-year history of the conference. Nichols, who made 18-of-33 shots, also had 11 assists, eight rebounds and eight steals. Both Nichols and Jordan Wiley (28 points), made 5-of-11 three-pointers. WOU played both of its games last week without Andy Avgi and were outrebounded by eight a game (79-63). On the year, it outrebounds its opponents by 4.1 per game to rank third in the conference.

Western Washington: The Vikings outshot their opponents 47.7 (21-of-44) to 28.1 percent (9-of-32) in their wins at Western Oregon and Saint Martin's as GNAC

Player of the Week Jeffrey Parker made 9-of-15, Ricardo Maxwell converted on 5-of-9 from the arc and Joey Schreiber cashed in on 5-of-10. Maxwell finished with 31 points and Schreiber had 25. Mac Johnson had a teamhigh 17 rebounds. ... WWU scored16 consecutive points to break a 44-44 tie on the way to a 73-50 upset of Western Oregon in Thursday's game.

Players of the Week - Week By Week

Nov. 10-16 – Jeffrey Parker, Western Washington (F, 6-6, So., Richmond, CA – Salesian) and Joseph Stroud, Central Washington (F, 6-8, Jr., Las Vegas, NV – Sierra Visa/Pierce College) ... Parker scored 43 points and also had 18 rebounds leading the Vikings to two wins in the 13th Chuck Randall Classic. Parker made seven of 17 3-pointers and shot 51.7 percent overall, cashing in on 15-of-29. He was named the tournament's MVP ... Stroud earned all-tournament honors leading the Wildcats to two wins in the Seattle Pacific Sodexo Tip-Off tournament. He came off the bench to score 24 points, making nine of 10 shots. He also led CWU in rebounds (11) and blocked shots (7). His last basket with one second half came on a dunk to break a 68-68 tie in Saturday's 70-68 win over Academy of Art.

Nov. 17-23: Ruben Silvas, Alaska (G, 6-3, 175, Jr., Tucson, AZ) had 33 points, shooting 62.5 percent (15-of-24) as the Nanooks made their 2014-15 season debut in the GCI Alaska Invitational. The JC transfer from Arizona also had 16 rebounds, two assists and a steal and wasn't charged with a turnover in earning all-tournament honors as the Nanooks won one of three contests.

Nov. 24-30: Julian Nichols, Western Oregon (G, 6-2, 175, Jr. Upland, CA) scored 51 points and also 10 rebounds, a team-high 14 assists and six steals in leading the Wolves to three road West Region victories, including a 67-52 win at 2014 playoff qualifier Dixie State. Nichols made 15 of 31 field goal attempts and also converted on 19 of 20 foul shots. Twenty-six of his points came in Saturday's 83-73 win at the Academy of Art.

Dec. 1-7: Dom Williams, Central Washington (G, 5-11, Sr., Tacoma, WA – Curtis & Tacoma CC) scored 50 points and also had 10 assists and just one turnover in wins over Montana State Billings and defending GNAC champion Seattle Pacific. He had a career-high 31 points and five assists in an 88-79 win over MSUB Thursday, connecting on 11 of 20 shots, including 5-of-7 three-pointers. Williams then added 19 points and five assists in a 73-67 victory against SPU Saturday, converting on 4-of-7 three-point shots. The win snapped a four-game CWU losing streak to the Falcons. For the week, Williams made 18-of-37 shots (48.6 percent), including 9-of-14 three-pointers. He also converted on 5-of-6 foul shots.

Dec. 8-14: Mitch Penner, Seattle Pacific (F, 6-5, Jr., Seattle, WA — Kennedy) scored 26 points and also had 11 rebounds, three steals and two blocks to lead the Falcons to a 100-67 win over George Fox. Penner, who made 7-of-12 field goal attempts, was perfect from the foul line connecting on 11-of-11.

Dec. 15-21: Shawn Reid, Seattle Pacific (F, 6-4, Sr., Post Falls, ID) scored a team-best 36 points shooting 71.4 percent in leading the Falcons to wins over Dixie State (76-66) and Rollins (74-54) in the Las Vegas Challenge. Reid made 15-of-21 shots, including 5-of-9 three-pointers. He also led the Falcons with three steals. Reid came off the bench against Dixie State with SPU trailing 17-2 and scored 30 points in just 18 minutes to rally SPU to the 10-point win. Reid, whose previous SPU career-high was 13, made 12 of 15 shots, including 5-of-7 from the arc.

Dec. 29-Jan. 4: Ashton Edwards, Alaska (G, Jr., Compton, CA - Long Beach CC) and Brian McGill, Alaska Anchorage (G, 6-2, Jr., Clackamas, OR – Western Oregon) ... Edwards scored 53 points including 30 in Thursday's 64-60 home win against Western Washington and 23 in Saturday's 121-111 victory against Simon Fraser. Edwards made 16-of-32 field goal attempts including 7-of-12 three-pointers and 14-of-15 free throws. He also had seven rebounds and four assists. His point total against the Vikings represented nearly 47 percent of the Nanooks' team total ... McGill had 48 points, nine rebounds and nine assists as the Seawolves also swept SFU (108-86) and Western Washington (62-60). McGill scored 28 points and had six rebounds in 26 minutes against the Clan Thursday and had a game-high 20 points, including the game-winning shot with 6.5 seconds left, in Saturday's win against Western Washington. In that contest, McGill was perfect from the foul line, converting on 8-of-8 attempts.

Jan. 5-11: Momir Gataric, MSU Billings (F, 6-5, Jr., Sunnyvale, CA – West Valley College) and Andy Avgi, Western Oregon (F, 6-6, Jr., Woodburn, OR) ... Gataric scored 45 points and shot 72.7 percent from the floor (16-of-22) as the Yellowjackets split two games defeating Simon Fraser 111-104 Saturday for their first conference win of the season. He had 25 points on 10 of 14 shooting in an 88-68 loss to Western Washington before contributing 20 points, five assists and four assists against the Clan ... Avgi scored 41 points as the Wolves defeated Northwest Nazarene and Central Washington to extend their home win streak to eight and take over sole possession of first place in the GNAC. Avgi made 17 of 29 shots, including a key tip-in with 23 seconds remaining in the win against NNU.

Jan. 12-18: Kevin Rima, Northwest Nazarene (F/C, 6-7, Sr., Fairbanks, AK - Hutchison) and Sango Niang, Simon Fraser (G, 6-0, Sr., Paris, France - Chaffey CC) ... Rima, who is averaging 12.2 points per game, scored 47 points and also had 19 rebounds to lead the Crusaders to their fourth and fifth wins in their last six games. He had 18 points and 12 rebounds, recording his 13th career double-double, in a 107-103 victory against Simon Fraser Thursday. Saturday, he tallied 29 points and grabbed seven rebounds in a 80-73 conquest of Western Washington. Rima, who made 18 of 25 field goal attempts and 11 of 13 foul shots, helped rally NNU from double-digit second-half deficits in both games ... Niang scored 71 points, including 46 in a 104-95 loss Saturday at Central Washington. That is the second highest single-game point total in GNAC history trailing only Western Washington's Ryan Diggs who scored 47 in 2006. Niang made 18 field goals equaling the GNAC single-game record set by Gerrit Eades of Saint Martin's in 2002. In two games, he made 27 of 46 field goal attempts and also had 11 assists.

Jan. 19-Jan. 25: Jordan Wiley, Western Oregon (G, 6-6, Jr., McKenzie River, OR) scored 26 points in a 114-75 win at Simon Fraser and had 15 points including a key three-pointer with 1:49 left in a 90-87 victory at Western Washington as the Wolves completed the first half of the conference race with an 8-1 record and a one-game lead over Seattle Pacific and Central Washington. Wiley shot 75.0 from the field (12-of-16) and also had nine rebounds, four assists and three steals in the two wins. He made 7-of-8 three-pointers against SFU equaling the second highest total for three-pointers made in a game with just one miss in GNAC history.

Jan. 26-Feb. 1: Andy Avgi, Western Oregon (F, 6-6, Jr., Woodburn, OR) and Derrick Fain, Alaska Anchorage (G, 6-4, Sr., Dallas, TX – The Master's) ... Avgi scored 46 points, including a career-high 33 in a 94-84 overtime win against Seattle Pacific Saturday as the Wolves opened up a two-

game in the conference race with wins over Montana State Billings and the Falcons. Avgi made 17 of 28 shots and 11 of 12 foul shots. He also had nine rebounds, five assists, three steals and two blocks. WOU extended its win streak to eight games and its home win streak to 11 with the two wins ... Fain scored 42 points and also had 15 rebounds as Alaska Anchorage, which plays five of its final seven games at home, improved to 5-2 in conference road contests with wins at Western Washington and Simon Fraser. Fain made 13-of-22 shots, including 9-of-15 from the three-point line. He also converted on 7-of-8 free throws as the Seawolves shot 81.2 percent (56-of-69) from the line.

Feb. 2-8: Anye Turner, Western Washington (F, 6-7, Sr., Olympia, WA – Black Hills) scored 23 points and also had 23 rebounds and nine blocks in leading the Vikings to a pair of 10-point road wins at Seattle Pacific (82-72) and MSU Billings (75-65). Turner played a key role defensively in WWU's win at SPU. He had all five of the Vikings' blocked shots as WWU held SPU to a 44.4 shooting percentage. The Falcons came into the game ranked fourth nationally in field goal percentage shooting 52.1 percent. Turner, who ranks sixth in GNAC history in career blocked shots with 152, converted 58.8 percent of his attempts, making 10 of 17. He also had four assists and a steal without committing a turnover.

Feb. 9-15 - Cory Hutsen, Seattle Pacific (C, 6-8, Sr., Sammamish, WA - Skyline) scored 43 points, including 23 in a 73-72 overtime win at Alaska Anchorage Saturday as the Falcons kept alive their chances to earn a first-round bye in next month's conference playoffs with two victories. Hutsen, who made 11 of 15 shots against the Seawolves, scored a basket with 2:18 left in overtime to give SPU its final lead at 70-68. In two wins in Alaska, Hutson made 20 of 29 field goal attempts and also had nine rebounds and a team-best three blocks helping SPU limit the Seawolves and Alaska Nanooks to a combined 40.7 shooting percentage.

Feb. 16-22: Jeffrey Parker, Western Washington (F, 6-6, So., Richmond, CA - Salesian) led the Vikings to two wins, including a 73-50 victory at Western Oregon snapping the Wolves' 11-game win streak. In the two contests, Parker scored 42 points, connecting on 16 of 25 shots, including 9-of-15 three-pointers. He also had six rebounds and three assists. WWU has won seven straight, six by double-digit margins.
