#### RED LION PLAYERS OF THE WEEK

**Offense** – Ryan Dhillon, Simon Fraser (M, 5-10, So., North Delta, BC – North Delta) led the GNAC with three goals last week, as No. 4 SFU displayed its offensive dominance with a pair of 7-0 victories. Dhillon twice found the net on Thursday against Northwest Nazarene, and then set the tone on Saturday with the Clan's first goal against Montana State Billings in the 25th minute.

**Defense** – Cody Lang, Seattle Pacific (GK, 6-4, Fr., Spokane, WA – Lewis & Clark) notched his conference-leading sixth and seventh shutouts of 2013 as SPU collected six points with two wins last week. The Falcon keeper made six saves and faced 15 total shots in the two games. On Thursday, Lang kept the University of Mary's offense quiet for 90 minutes, and then gave SPU the chance for the game winner in the 85th minute on Saturday against South Dakota Mines by silencing the Hardrockers' offense. Lang has not allowed a goal in his last 290 minutes between the posts.

**Honorable Mention** – Keegan Rogers, WWU (GK, 6-1, Jr., Portland, OR – Portland Christian) made six saves and helped the Vikings to a pair of shutout victories...John DiLulo, NNU (F, 5-8, Sr., Boise, ID – Boise) had three shots in NNU's 7-0 loss at No. 4 Simon Fraser on Thursday, and had a shot off the goal post in NNU's 1-0 overtime loss at Western Washington on Saturday...Daniel Day, NNU (D, 5-11, Jr., Salem, OR – Chemeketa) played two full games on defense as NNU lost 7-0 at No. 4 Simon Fraser and 1-0 in overtime at Western Washington. Against the Vikings, Day had the lone shot on goal for the Crusaders...Andrew Weishaar, WWU (F, 6-1, Sr., Puyallup, WA – Puyallup) scored in overtime against NNU to propel the Vikings to a 1-0 victory and help WWU keep pace with SFU and SPU in the GNAC standings...Magnus Kristensen, SFU (D, 6-3, Fr., Stayenger, Norway) helped anchor the SFU back line in a pair of 7-0 shutouts, while contributing two goals for the Clan.

**CLAN FINDING THEIR STRIDE:** Simon Fraser is peaking at the right time, winning its last three contests by the score of 7-0. Prior to the three consecutive wins, SFU suffered its worst stretch of 2013, going 2-1-1 including its first loss of the season to SPU on Oct. 3.

**SPU KEEPING PACE:** While the Falcons scored just three goals last week compared to SFU's 14, SPU kept pace with the Clan in the standings with a pair of victories and six points. SPU extended its unbeaten streak to 14 consecutive games, and remains just one point behind SFU in the conference standings.

#### **WHERE THERE'S A WEISHAAR**

**THERE'S A WAY:** The Vikings' senior forward continues to will WWU to dramatic victories with late-game heroics. Weishaar put his talents on display again last week, scoring in the 95th minute against NNU to push WWU to the 1-0 victory. Two wins kept WWU just four points back of conference leader SFU and three points behind second place SPU.

**SAINTS' MIRACLE:** With 11 minutes to play on Saturday, Saint Martin's found itself trailing the University of Mary 4-1 on its home turf. Rene Caro and Kaleb Strawn each provided two assists down the stretch as SMU rattled off three goals in the final 11 minutes of regulation and the teams battled to a 4-4 overtime draw. With a 2-1 victory over SD Mines on Thursday, SMU came away with four points and an overall successful weekend.

**TOTALLY TODY TOLO:** SMU defender Tody Tolo leads the GNAC amongst field players in minutes played so far this season with 1,407, tied with teammate CJ Chu. The pair has started every game of the season for the Saints.

#### **JACKETS, CRUSADERS SILENCED:**

Montana State Billings and Northwest Nazarene were each shut out twice last week, with MSU Billings placing just six total shots on frame against WWU and SFU. NNU had an even tougher time against the same two opponents, placing just four total shots on target. Neither team has scored in their last three contests, since MSUB beat SMU 4-0 and NNU earned a 2-2 tie with SPU on Oct. 17.

**DOUBLE-DIGIT SCORERS:** Of the five players to score more than once last week, four were members of SFU. GNAC Offensive Player

of the Week Ryan Dhillon led the way with three goals, while Jacques, Kristensen and Carlo Basso each contributed two goals for the Clan, while Mary's Jordan Pearce found the net twice.

**RECORDS:** With four points last week, Carlo Basso of SFU moved into second place in the GNAC record books in career points with 104...Basso entered 2013 in 4th place with 88 career points, and his 16 points this season pushed him past Bobby McAlister (SU, 93) and Gibson Bardsley (WWU, 100)...SFU's Colin Jacques leads the GNAC with eight assists, and is approaching the all-time single-season conference mark of 11 held by Thomas Chameraud of MSU Billings, recorded last season...WWU's Weishaar is on pace to break the GNAC single-season records for shots, as he has 76 and is averaging 5.07 per game with three games remaining, and the record standing at 88...with three conference games remaining, SFU is 13 goals behind its record of 73 it set last season with 60 in 2013, but last season's total included four postseason games...SFU is on pace to break its own record of goals per game in a season (3.42) as it is averaging 4.0 in 2013...for the first time in GNAC history, eight goals were scored in a single half in the 4-4 draw between SMU and Mary...the feat was last completed by a now-GNAC team in the 2000 season – twice – when then-PacWest members Hawaii Pacific beat NNU 11-2 (7-1 in the 2nd half) and Seattle Pacific beat NNU 13-1 (7-1 in the 1st half).

**PLAYOFF PICTURE:** With no automatic bids to the NCAA postseason, the top six ranked teams in the final NCAA West Region poll will advance to the post season. Currently, SFU and SPU fall into that category, ranked No. 4 and No. 6, respectively, but with those two teams playing one other and each facing third-place WWU over the final three matches, all three teams have excellent opportunities to earn a postseason berth.
